

Hilton Head PSD Sewer Main Project Complete



The PSD is thrilled to announce that the sewer main installation projects funded by the Town of Hilton Head Island are complete.

This was a 5-year effort completed in less than 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years from the initial Town funding being formally approved in June 2017. In all, more than 9 miles of sewer mains were installed to serve 57 different roads. To date, the connection rate for these projects is already nearly 40%.

No new septic systems are allowed to be installed where public sewer is available, and likewise no failing septic systems are allowed to be repaired where public sewer is available. The PSD wishes to thank its partners in this tremendous effort, including

our customers, our contractor – Jordan Construction of Hilton Head, the Hilton Head Town Council, PSD Commission, Town of Hilton Head Island staff, and the Community Foundation of the Lowcountry and its Project SAFE (Sewer Access for Everyone) charitable fund.

Project SAFE has raised nearly \$3 million for low- to moderate-income sewer connection grants as part of this sewer main installation effort. Customers interested in connecting to sewer can contact the PSD at (843) 681-5525 or info@hhpsd.com.

The Deep Well Project assists customers in completing Project SAFE applications for sewer connection grants from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday at its 80 Capital Drive office.

Hilton Head PSD earned an EPA WaterSense Award!



Hilton Head Public Service District (PSD) has been recognized by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's WaterSense program for its efforts to promote water efficiency.

The PSD earned a 2019 WaterSense Honorable Mention Award for its "success in going above and beyond in promoting WaterSense and water efficiency," said WaterSense Program Manager Veronica Blette.

The PSD uses a variety of approaches to encourage efficient use of water, including newsletters, social media, and smart-landscaping workshops. The PSD's Oak Park Drive site achieved certification as an Audubon International Cooperative Sanctuary in 2019, which involved projects such as partnering with Clemson University Cooperative Extension to provide a customer workshop on the Carolina Yards program that encourages a set of principles for residents to use to create watershed-friendly landscapes.

Safely dispose of prescription drugs with two Drug Take Back events in Beaufort County.



Through a coordinated effort among the Beaufort County Alcohol and Drug Abuse Department, the Lowcountry Alliance for Healthy Youth and the Beaufort County Sheriff's Office, Drug Enforcement Administration drug take back events have been scheduled for 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. October 26, 2019 at the following locations:

- Beaufort: The parking lot of the Beaufort County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Center, 2001 Duke Street, Beaufort 29902
- Bluffton: The parking lot of Beaufort County's Bluffton Government Center
- 4819 Bluffton Parkway, Bluffton 29910

Liquid medications, sharps, medical waste or inventory from medical practices will not be accepted.

Unable to Drop Off Prescription Drugs on Saturday, October 26?

To provide a convenient and safe way for Beaufort County residents to dispose of unused and potential dangerous medications, prescription drug drop-off boxes were installed in the Beaufort County Sheriff's Office and government locations in Beaufort, Bluffton and on Hilton Head Island.

Since the installation of the boxes, and thanks to Beaufort County residents, more than 2,800 pounds of unused prescription medications have been collected by personnel. These prescription drugs have been properly disposed of and kept out of the wrong hands, according to a Beaufort County Sheriff's Office press release.

Should we break our bottled water habit?

Bottled water's growing popularity stems in part from its convenience but also from the perception that it's higher-quality water. Forty percent of Americans believe bottled is safer than tap, according to a nationally representative 2019 Consumer Reports survey of 4,225 U.S. adults.

But even as bottled water sales have risen, tap water quality overall doesn't appear to be

getting worse. Since 2013, the percentage of the U.S. population serviced by community water systems with at least one reportable health-based quality violation has stayed below 10 percent, according to the most recent data from the Environmental Protection Agency, which regulates tap water. These systems provide water to more than 90 percent of Americans, according to the EPA. "The United States provides some of the safest drinking water in the world," an agency spokesperson says.

To be sure, the vast majority of bottled water sold today also appears to be safe. But it isn't necessarily better overall than tap, and there are some reasons for concern, CR found.

Those "flushable" wipes aren't actually good for your pipes

The only place to dispose of these products is the trashcan.



The widespread use of "flushable wipes" and similar products is clogging sewer lift stations and laterals — resulting in costly repairs and unnecessary maintenance expenses that are borne by all customers.

According to a recent Forbes article, a study tested 101 single-use wipes and not one of them passed a flushability test. Instead, the wipes failed to fall apart or disperse safely in tests.
