


Hilton Head Island Middle School Science Fair Project Puts PSD to the Test



Hilton Head Island Middle School held its annual Science Fair this month, and the PSD's tap water was included in a project by sixth-grade student Danielle Ryan. Danielle compared the total dissolved solids (TDS) in several sources of water and

found that the PSD's tap water is one of the lowest in TDS. Danielle is the daughter of PSD Water Treatment Technician Tim Ryan and she visited the PSD's Reverse Osmosis Drinking Water Treatment Facility on Jenkins Island as part of her project. Congrats to Danielle and all the students at Hilton Head Island Middle School on a great Science Fair!

PSD's Leg O'Mutton Ground Storage Tank on Gardner Dr. got a new paint job!



The PSD's Leg O'Mutton ground storage tank on Gardner Drive received a new paint job this year! The new coating was provided by Aquatera Ownership, the developers of the new apartment complex on Gardner Drive.

The new color is a standard color that was approved by the Town of Hilton Head Island. The Leg O'Mutton tank holds 2 million gallons of treated drinking water and is one of three ground storage tanks and five elevated storage towers in the PSD's water distribution system.

If your home is still using a septic system, it's time to make the switch and connect to the sewer system.

Leaking septics can be hazardous to your health, and they can no longer be repaired on the island since sewer hookups are now available everywhere on Hilton Head Island. (Per S.C. DHEC regulations: Where public sewer is available, repairs to failing septic systems are not allowed, nor may any new septic systems be installed).

Reminder: Please don't flush unused medications

Unused medications should be properly disposed of at one of Beaufort County's drop-off boxes —

not flushed down the toilet or thrown in a trashcan.

These drop-off boxes keep prescription drugs off the streets and out of the drains. There are three drug drop-off boxes in Beaufort County:

- The Beaufort County Sheriff's Office on Hilton Head, located at 58 Shelter Cove Lane.
- Beaufort County Government Building, 4819 Bluffton
 Parkway in Bluffton.
- The Beaufort County Sheriff's Office, located at 2001 Duke Street in Beaufort.

Harriett Tubman | From the <u>Railroad to</u> a Spy



- ☐ Wait to do laundry or run the dishwasher until you have a full load and use cold water when possible to also save energy.
- \square Turn off the tap when brushing your teeth.
