If your home is still using a septic system, it's time to make the switch and connect to the sewer system.

Leaking septics can be hazardous to your health, and they can no longer be repaired on the island since sewer hookups are now available everywhere on Hilton Head Island. (Per S.C. DHEC regulations: Where public sewer is available, repairs to failing septic systems are not allowed, nor may any new septic systems be installed).

Reminder: Please don't flush unused medications


Unused medications should be properly disposed of at one of Beaufort County's drop-off boxes — not flushed down the toilet or thrown in a trashcan.

Trying to teach your little one what not to flush?

We know — trying to answer your little one's constant, "But, why?!" when you try to teach them something new can be exhausting.

We're here to help.

We know flushing the wrong thing down the toilet can be expensive (and messy!) and so it's an important lesson for the little ones.

We created a ton of free downloads you can use to help

teach them what they should and shouldn't flush — including a fun science experiment that'll show kids how wipes don't dissolve in the same way toilet paper does (so you can already be prepared when they ask the inevitable, "But, why?").

There are also worksheets — including a word search, crossword puzzle and a matching game — and fun posters you can hang in the bathroom to serve as a constant reminder.

2. ADD 2 SQUARES OF TOILET PAPER TO ONE CUP OR 2.ADD 2 SQUARES OF TOILET PAPER TO ONE CUP OR BOW!

3.ADD 1 "FLUSHABLE" WIPE TO THE OTHER CUP OR BOW!

4.STIR BOTH CERTLY WITH A POON

5.SET A TIMER FOR 10 MINUTES

6. DESERVE IF ETHER THE TOILET PAPER OR THE WIPE DISSOLVED MORE. WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU STIR THEM ACKNOWLED WHAT IF YOU TOUCH THEM WITH YOUR FINCERS? DO THEY FALL APART?
