## Make sure to follow Hilton Head's irrigation ordinance this summer

That means your irrigation controller must have a working rain gauge — and you should only water your lawn no more than twice per week.

We also ask that you avoid watering your lawn during the heat of the day. Instead, water early in the morning or in the evening, after it has cooled off a bit outside.



# Hilton Head PSD Commission candidate filing notice

The Hilton Head Public Service District (PSD) Commission will have four seats up for election during the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2024. One seat each in PSD Voting Districts 2, 3, 4, and 6, will be up for election. Commissioners are elected to four-year terms.

The filing period begins July 15 and ends at noon on August 15. All candidates must reside in and be currently registered to vote in the PSD Voting District for which they are seeking office. Candidates' voter registration must match their current residence at the time of the election.

Citizens who are interested in filing for candidacy must do so in person at the PSD Customer Service Center at 21 Oak Park Drive off Mathews Drive, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, by arranging to sign the Statement

of Intention of Candidacy – Nonpartisan form in the presence of the PSD's General Manager or authorized representative. The filing form is available at the PSD or may be downloaded from the S.C. Election Commission website:

Candidates are required to file a Statement of Economic Interests and a Campaign Disclosure online with the State Ethics Commission at <a href="https://ethics.sc.gov/">https://ethics.sc.gov/</a>. Failure to file these documents may result in a candidate fine but will not disqualify a candidate from the election. Contact the State Ethics Commission for more information.

# IT'S HURRICANE SEASON. MAKE SURE YOU STAY PREPARED!





The Atlantic has already seen its first major hurricane this season. Rapidly intensifying to a Category 5 hurricane by July 1, Hurricane Beryl was the earliest Cat 5 hurricane on record — and one of the earliest storms to undergo such rapid intensification.

For some perspective, the Atlantic doesn't typically see a major hurricane (Cat 3 or higher) until September.

Forecasters are now predicting an even <u>more active hurricane season</u> than previously thought.

Now's the time to prepare in case a hurricane does head our way.

Make sure you have a stocked emergency kit, know your zone & evacuation route, know how to properly store drinking water, and know how to protect your home


There are many different ways you can prepare now in case a storm does head our way this season:

 Keep a stocked hurricane kit that includes food & water to last at least 3 days, a first aid kit, personal hygiene items, flash lights and other emergency items.
 You can find a comprehensive list here.

- Make sure you're properly storing drinking water in clean, non-corrosive, tightly covered containers and keep those containers in a cool, dark location.
- Know how to prepare your home. This should include knowing where your water shut-off valve is located, how to protect your water heater, and having supplies like sandbags, plywood or storm shutters ready to go.
- Make a plan! If a hurricane does head for our area, you'll need to know your zone and evacuation routes in case a mandatory evacuation is ordered.
- Prepare a "go bag" to grab in case of an evacuation. This should include any
  important documents (birth certificates, etc.), prescription medications,
  glasses or contacts, toiletries, a change of clothes or two, and any comfort
  items you'd like to have with you (or have for a child or family member).

Make sure to follow local officials in the event a storm does head our way. To keep up with hurricane forecasts, follow the National Hurricane Center on social media and see daily updated forecasts on their website, <a href="https://nhc.noaa.gov">nhc.noaa.gov</a>.

## Don't forget about your pets when making your hurricane plan!



Your emergency kit should include your pets' needs as well — food, water, any medications and maybe a few comfort items like a blanket or toy.

Your "go-bag" should include your pets' paperwork (especially vaccination records) with your important paperwork!

You should also make sure you have an evacuation plan in place that includes your pets, as most storm shelters that open in our area do not allow pets.

Research pet-friendly hotels ahead of time or plan to stay with a friend or family member. Hotels are not required to allow pets during an evacuation, though many pet-friendly hotels will waive their pet fees.

The South Carolina Emergency Management Division has a guide for making an emergency plan that involves your pets <u>here</u>.

### Water Tip:



Know the location of your water meter and keep it clean and clear for regular readings, maintenance and emergencies.

### Don't waste water this summer!



Only run full loads in the dishwasher & washer



Use a pool cover to reduce evaporation



Aim for 5-minute showers



Save water used for rinsing produce to water indoor plants



Don't use your sprinkler during the heat of the day

### **Lowcountry Community Indicators**

The Lowcountry region—Beaufort, Colleton, Hampton, and Jasper Counties—experienced unprecedented growth, development, and change between 1990 and 2005. Between 2007 and 2010, a nationwide economic downturn negatively affected the region. Since 2011, the regional economy has shown signs of continuously rebounding. There is a great deal of quantitative information and data available that both confirms and explains what has taken place.

To continue monitoring and evaluating the state of the Lowcountry region, the Lowcountry Community Indicators (LCI) Project was initiated. The LCI consolidates the Community Foundation of the Lowcountry's Community Indicators Report and the Lowcountry Council of Governments' the People and the Economy Report. These two reports are complementary, providing common criteria and metrics related to the Lowcountry region.

The main objective of the LCI is to provide a centralized community

resource offering relevant indicators that help support informed decision-making. The LCI will assist citizen leaders, public officials and policy makers, nonprofit organizations, businesses, researchers, and the media in making decisions to positively affect the community's well-being.

The LCI offers key indicators for the region that are understandable, meaningful, and accessible through its website <a href="www.lowcountrycommunityindicators.org">www.lowcountrycommunityindicators.org</a>. The website allows users to view, navigate to, and download specific, relevant indicators of each topic mentioned above. In addition, the user will have the ability to locate all the data for one specific county or compare the data for all four counties.
