

Much of our country's water infrastructure is more than 100 years old, and the impacts of aging and un-repaired pipes are evident in communities everywhere—in fact, a water main breaks every two minutes somewhere in the U.S.

And, though not well known, over two million Americans still lack the dignity of access to water and wastewater services.

And that doesn't even take into account the devastation from the recent hurricane, which left several towns in Western North Carolina and elsewhere in Appalachia without working water.

Lowcountry Community Indicators

The Lowcountry region—Beaufort, Colleton, Hampton, and Jasper Counties —experienced unprecedented growth, development, and change between 1990 and 2005. Between 2007 and 2010, a nationwide economic downturn negatively affected the region. Since 2011, the regional economy has shown signs of continuously rebounding. There is a great deal of quantitative information and data available that both confirms and explains what has taken place.

To continue monitoring and evaluating the state of the Lowcountry region, the Lowcountry Community Indicators (LCI) Project was initiated. The LCI consolidates the Community Foundation of the Lowcountry's <u>Community</u> <u>Indicators Report</u> and the Lowcountry Council of Governments' <u>the People</u> <u>and the Economy Report</u>. These two reports are complementary, providing common criteria and metrics related to the Lowcountry region.

The main objective of the LCI is to provide a centralized community resource offering relevant indicators that help support informed decisionmaking. The LCI will assist citizen leaders, public officials and policy makers, nonprofit organizations, businesses, researchers, and the media in making decisions to positively affect the community's well-being.


The LCI offers key indicators for the region that are understandable, meaningful, and accessible through its website <u>www.lowcountrycommunityindicators.org</u>. The website allows users to view, navigate to, and download specific, relevant indicators of each topic mentioned above. In addition, the user will have the ability to locate all the data for one specific county or compare the data for all four counties.
